A Letter for Change

- This activity was created to allow students to not only think about social change but become active participants in it. Through this activity, students will notice things around them and think about ways to make them better, becoming authentic changemakers.
- This activity is designed for whole class, small group, and individual work.
- Ensure the activity meets individual learning needs by providing sentence frames or a word wall if necessary.

Steps

- 1. Have students come up with a list of problems in their community. As students share, write all ideas on the whiteboard or an anchor chart (e.g., litter at the park, lack of resources like books).
- 2. Once all these thoughts are organized, assign students to a group or allow them to choose a group of three people. As a group, select a problem and discuss how they would solve the problem.
- 3. Have these groups discuss who they could go to about this issue (e.g., the mayor, principal, city council) and discuss what they would say to this person or group. Use the "Problem Solvers" template, to help students organize their ideas.
- 4. After this, students will then individually write letters to their community leaders about what they want to do to help their community. Take action by finding the address and mailing your letters!

Steps

- 1. Talk with your child about the importance of participating in their community and how being a good citizen is important.
- 2. Have your child make a list of things they could do to help their community (e.g., picking up trash at the park, donating books to local children).
- 3. Explain to your child that for the next month, you want them to attempt each item on the list. Put the list up so your child can cross them off as they complete them.


