## Theme: Nature | Classroom Activity

Common Core Standard: CCRA.R.2, CCRA.W.7 | Next Generation Science Standard: LS1-1 and LS4-1

#### **Nocturnal Animal Research**

- This activity is right for independent work, pairs, or small group work collaboration.
- Adjust the activity according to the needs of your individual students by assigning specific roles for pair or group work.

#### **Steps**

#### **Whole Group**

- 1. Begin by creating a KWL chart (next page) on nocturnal animals with the class.
- 2. Turn the "W" (What we want to know) section into specific research questions.

Sample guiding questions:

- · Where does the animal live?
- What does it eat?
- How does it help its environment?
- What does it do at night?

#### **Small Group/Individual**

- 1. Students choose a nocturnal animal and conduct research using student-friendly sources (e.g., PebbleGo, National Geographic Kids, books in the library or classroom).
- 2. Using the worksheet provided, students record answers to the research questions.

#### **Optional Extension**

Encourage students to showcase their learning by selecting a creative presentation format (e.g., a mural, video, advertisement).

## Theme: Nature | Home Activity

Our class is learning about nocturnal animals with literacy resources from Reading Is Fundamental (RIF). To deepen their understanding of this concept, here is a suggested activity you can complete with your child at home.

### **Nighttime Nature Walk**

#### **Preparing For the Walk**

- 1. Dress appropriately for the weather and bring a flashlight (preferably with a red filter to avoid disturbing animals).
- 2. Bring a small notebook or use a phone to take notes or record observations.

#### On the Walk

- 1. Go on a walk after dinner. Choose a safe, familiar route near your home, in a park, or even your backyard.
- 2. As you walk, encourage your child to use all five senses (safely!):
  - "I hear frogs croaking."
  - "I see fireflies flashing."
  - "I smell fire crackling."
  - "I feel the cool night breeze."
- 3. Ask guiding questions:
  - · What do you think that sound is?
  - Why do you think that animals come out at night?

#### **After the Walk**

- 1. When you return home, make a list together of all the animals or signs of animals you experienced (e.g., owl hooting, moths, bat flying, tracks in dirt).
- 2. Talk with your child. Ask them:
  - What role do these animals play in nature?
  - How do they help the environment?


