Around The World Show & Tell

Steps

1. Consider sending home the family letter (page 4) along with the optional home activity to help students prepare for show and tell. This activity can support family involvement, but it's not required — all students will have an equal opportunity to participate and share.
2. Invite students to sit in a circle and take turns presenting their special items. If a student did not bring an item, you can help them find an image online or an object in the classroom to use instead. Encourage students to answer these questions:
 - What did you bring for show and tell?
 - How is this item special to you and your family?
 - Tell us the story of how you got this item.
 - Does this item come from a specific place in the world?

Geography Connection

1. After each presentation, help students find the country or region their item relates to on a world map or globe.
2. Place a sticker or marker on that location. This will create a visual map of the class's cultural connections.

Small Group/Individual

1. After all students share have a class discussion using these guiding questions.
 - What are some ways our items are the same or different?
 - What do these items teach us about traditions, values, or ways of life?
 - How do families celebrate, remember, or create together?
2. On chart paper, create a Venn Diagram (next page) or a list of similarities and differences.
3. Discuss how learning about others helps build a stronger and kinder community.



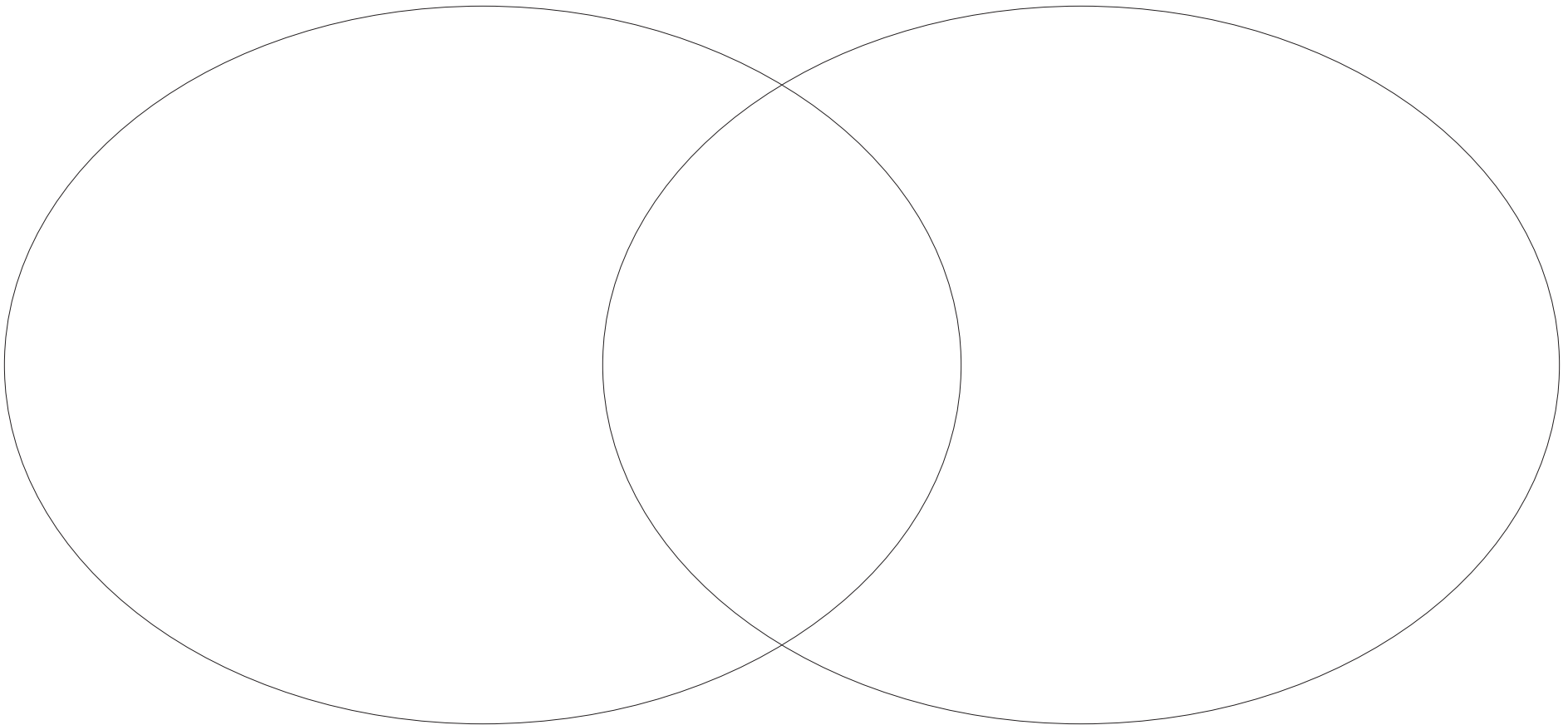

The Story of Our Special Item

Steps

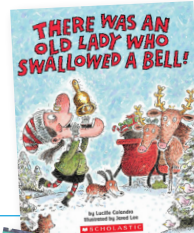
1. Spend some time with your child talking about a meaningful item from your home or family life. Use the guiding questions below to help spark a rich conversation about its personal or cultural significance:
 - What is this item?
 - Where does it come from?
 - Who gave it to us, or how did we get it?
 - Why is it special to our family?
 - Is there a celebration, tradition, or memory connected to it?
2. Together, look for the country or region on a map that the item comes from or is connected to. Talk about its location and how it relates to where you live now.
3. Take time to reflect and share stories. If your child would like, they can tell the story of this item to a sibling, friend, or another family member. Celebrate the memories and meaning that make this item special to your family.

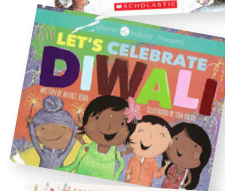

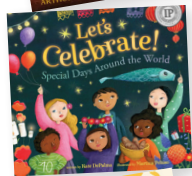
